"Tackling Technology, Guiding Our Children Through a Digital World"

On Monday, 16 September, from 7:00 PM to 8:30 PM Orewa College are hosting this important event. This event, organised by a dedicated group of local parents on the Hibiscus Coast, will focus on the crucial topic of technology and social media's impact on youth. The evening, titled "Tackling Technology, Guiding Our Children Through a Digital World'" will include Holly Jean Brooker, a specialist speaker in parent education, and Andrew Cowie, foundation Deputy Principal at Nukumea Primary School, who specialises in this area working previously as an Education Manager for Netsafe. Holly and Andrew will delve into key topics including:

- Online safety and bullying.
- The impact of social media
- Gaming and its effects
- Parental controls and filters

As we are increasingly aware, technology offers both incredible opportunities for creativity and interaction. However, recent research, including Jonathan Haidt's "The Anxious Generation," has put a spotlight on the significant risks posed by technology and social media to youth well-being. These issues include online addiction, passive consumption, and a decline in play-based childhood experiences. The research also suggests that collective community action is essential in effectively supporting our youth, as isolated efforts by individual families can sometimes lead to increased feelings of isolation during adolescence.

Packed with up-to-date information, practical insights, and actionable tips, Holly and Andrew will aim to equip parents and caregivers with the tools they need to navigate their children's digital experiences safely and effectively.

We believe this event is a valuable opportunity for our community to come together and address the challenges posed by our rapidly evolving digital landscape. New Curriculum

You would be aware that our new government is introducing a new Maths and English curriculum in 2025. The government's priorities are:

Clearer curriculum

Establishing a knowledge-rich curriculum grounded in the science of learning.

· Better approach to literacy and numeracy

Implementing evidence-based instruction in early literacy and mathematics.

· Smarter assessment and reporting

Implementing consistent modes of monitoring student progress and achievement.

· Improved teacher education

Developing the workforce of the future, including leadership development pathways.

· Stronger learning support

Targeting effective learning support interventions for students with additional needs.

· Greater use of data

Using data and evidence to drive consistent improvement in achievement.

The government's priorities are also our priorities. We welcome the fact that these priorities have been established.

Draft Maths Curriculum Information

The New Zealand Ministry of Education is in the process of updating the mathematics curriculum, with a draft version currently under review. The aim of the new curriculum is to better prepare students for the future by focusing on key concepts and skills in mathematics that are relevant to everyday life and future learning.

Key Changes in the Draft Mathematics Curriculum

Focus on Key Mathematical Concepts - The new curriculum emphasises a deeper understanding of core mathematical ideas rather than covering a wide range of topics superficially. This means students will spend more time on critical concepts like number sense, algebra, geometry, and statistical literacy.

Progressions of Learning - The curriculum outlines clear progressions for learning mathematics just like we have been using with SchoolTalk (so nothing new to you). This helps teachers and parents understand what students should know and be able to do at each stage of their schooling. The focus is on building a strong foundation in the early years, with increasingly complex concepts introduced as students progress.

Real-World Application - There is a greater emphasis on applying mathematical knowledge to real-world situations. This approach aims to make maths more relevant and engaging for students, helping them see the practical value of what they are learning.

Problem-Solving and Critical Thinking - The draft curriculum highlights the importance of developing students' problem-solving and critical-thinking skills. Students will be encouraged to think mathematically, explore different strategies, and justify their reasoning.

Cultural Responsiveness - The curriculum aims to be more inclusive and culturally responsive, recognizing the diverse backgrounds of students in New Zealand. It includes perspectives and contexts relevant to Māori and Pasifika students, ensuring that all students see themselves reflected in the curriculum.

Digital Tools and Technology - The new curriculum incorporates the use of digital tools and technology in learning mathematics. This reflects the increasing role of technology in education and the importance of preparing students for a digital future.

What This Means for Parents

Support at Home - Parents can support their children's learning by engaging with the concepts outlined in the curriculum. This might involve discussing maths in everyday contexts, such as cooking, shopping, or budgeting, to reinforce the practical application of skills. Resource Availability - As the new curriculum is rolled out, there will be resources and guidance available for parents to help them understand the changes and support their children's learning at home.

Transition Period - Since the curriculum is still in draft form, there will be a transition period as schools adapt to t

The draft curriculum is currently open for feedback, and parents are encouraged to participate in the consultation process. This is an opportunity to share thoughts and concerns, ensuring that the final version of the curriculum meets the needs of all students in New Zealand.

Student Attendance Focus

Recent Ministry of Education data reveals that less than half of students in New Zealand are attending school regularly. In response, the government has introduced an Attendance Action Plan to address this issue. The plan aims to increase student attendance, with a target of ensuring that 80% of students attend school for more than 90% of the term by 2030.

Key actions include:

- Collecting and analysing data to understand the reasons behind non-attendance.
- Developing a Traffic Light System to monitor and improve attendance.
- Introducing daily reporting of attendance data.
- Making attendance a strategic priority for school boards.

The plan emphasises the need for collaboration between schools, parents, and the community to effectively address truancy and ensure that every child has access to education.

Health guidance published by Health New Zealand | Te Whatu Ora is available to help you to decide if a student is well enough to attend school, including those students experiencing anxiety.

The guidance supports discussions with parents and caregivers about absence, the importance of minimising disruptions to learning, and positive re-entry to learning after sickness.
